Sensational finish to the Wolfgang Heidenfeld Memorial tournament

The Wolfgang Heidenfeld Memorial tournament has come to an end after almost exactly 30 months play. You can see the crosstable above.

Congratulations to our President, David Salter, who earned the ICCF international master title with a splendid performance, culminating in a dogged defence to earn a half point against Egbert Bösenberg.

This left David needing only a draw from a favourable position in the last game against Rechtman. With an extra pawn in a queen and minor piece endgame, he could have played on for months seeking outright third prize, but decided to settle for the certainty of the immediate IM title. David's qualification was ratified just in time for the 2002 ICCF Congress.

15 players began this Category 5 tournament, the first invitational event we ever organised. Originally the IM norm was 9/14 but after the accepted withdrawal of Ciaran O'Hare, for health reasons, the norm was changed to 8.5/13 with the possibility remaining to get the IM title in one event. (An IM norm in this event also counts as a SIM norm.) Despite the initial disappointment of early withdrawals (one approved and

OTHER NEWS

2nd Email Olympiad

The preliminaries of the 2nd email Olympiad (Olympiad XV) are due to to commence on December 1 and our team of six players will be expected to give a high level of commitment to trying to qualify for the final. Unfortunately SIM Alan Ludgate won't be available until the final and Neil Johnson decided to withdraw due to overwork and poor form. We have a strong team nevertheless with an IM and three SIMs, average rating 2443: this must be the highest ranked Irish team ever! The following team has been declared (in board order following the new ratings): Dr Eugene Gibney, Darrell Nightingale, Desmond Taylor, Tim Harding, Jonathan O'Connor and Michael Sheehan. We hope that all our other master strength players will be willing to play in the next postal olympiad.

Ongoing Team Events

The main team events currently in progress are the 5th North Atlantic Team Tournament and the 6th European Team Championship. We are in 8th place, just below 50%. European Teams (12 boards, 10 games each). This event, which began in October 1999, is almost over and many players have finshed their games.

Clearly this has been a tough event for us and we welcome the reduction in the number of boards proposed for the next championship (likely to be 10 or 8). That event is likely to start in 12 months time and may be an email tournament.

Friendly Team Matches

David Salter reports that the match v France has started with 31 boards (18 by email).

Matches in progress: we are losing 17.5-20.5 to the USA; losing 25-27 to NCCA with one disputed game to finish the match; losing 14-23 to the Czechs and losing 5.5-14.5 to the Danes. Results are less important in these events than giving players the opportunity to gain experience or keep in practice, and also to gain qualifying games towards an ICCF rating.

Evening Herald Events

At the time of writing, the 2000-2002 Championship (Evening Herald Senior A) had not yet been decided, with four games unfinished in late summer. Michael Sheehan has beaten James McKeown to finish on 4/6. William Breslin and Murtagh O'Connor are still in contention.

The 2001-2003 event is in full swing and the players are: William J. Breslin, Neil Johnson, Patrick Kelly, James McKeown, Murtagh O'Connor, Michael J. Sheehan and Garry H. Windebank.

We only know of four results so far. Sheehan beat Breslin and Sheehan beat Johnson. Windebank beat Kelly and drew with Johnson.

The 2002-4 championship is about to start. We hope to have a report on all these events in the Christmas newsletter.

'ICCF Gold' Book

ICCF events: what can I enter and what does it cost?

Please see the table below for a summary of the types of available event and entry fees payable to ICCA before we can submit your entry. We can only accept entries from members so if you are not a currently paid-up member, you know what to do...

1. Entry fees are the same for equivalent class of event (e.g. World/European Championship semi-final, Master Norms, 7- and 11-player class events) irrespective of whether the event is by post or email and which tournament office (European/ World/ Email) is organising it. Open Class and Higher Class may be only 7-players in most tournament offices; check the ICCF website for details.

2. The European TO now offers European Email events as an alternative to the Email Tournament Office events where you can get an opponent from anywhere in the world. When entering, always specify World/ European/ ICCF Email TO and in the case of European events whether you want a postal or an email event.

Please supply an email address if possible, even if you are entering a postal event.

There is a small mark-up on entry fees to cover ICCA administration, our membership fee to ICCF (50 Swiss Francs per annum), the cost of bank charges in making a payment to ICCF and something to cover currency fluctuations.

Members of EU/ Olympiad teams will be expected to pay their share of the entry fee. There is no participation fee in the friendly matches. NB: In thematic tournaments (which are NOT rated) two games are played against each opponent. Some thematics are now being played by email; see the ICCF website for details of next year's themes.

All other events are single games against opponents and all other events are rated. ICCF now publishes rating lists twice yearly: April 1 and October 1 based on results to the previous December 31/ June 30. The Irish Championship (Evening Herald Senior A) and friendly matches **are** rated.

Please note: Tim Harding does not collect entry fee/membership money. Payments in Euros should be sent to Jack Killane; payments in Pounds Sterling should be sent to David Blair. They inform Tim when an entry has been paid for and then he sends it in to ICCF. European and email sections are formed more rapidly than World events.




